OVERVIEW OF PROJECT WORK AND OUTCOMES

Non-technical summary

The Pan-Asia Risk Reduction (PARR) Fellowship Program offers unique research, training and educational opportunities to Asian researchers, practitioners, and policy makers to enhance their capabilities for advancing and applying knowledge on critical issues of GEC and risk in the Asia-Pacific. The 2014-2015 PARR Fellowship Program provided Fellowships for scientific capacity development on the topic of urban disaster risk and vulnerability under global environmental change.

Objectives

The main objectives of the project were:

- 1. Train a cadre of young Asian scientists and professionals in advanced understanding and management of the complex relationships between GEC and human and environmental security;
- 2. Strengthen the capacities of a spectrum of regional institutions (e.g., universities, research institutions, NGOs, government agencies, the private sector) to provide relevant opportunities for inter- and trans-disciplinary research, education and application; and
- 3. Nurture a collaborative and sustainable network of such individuals and institutions so that it becomes an active resource for promoting and facilitating future research, decision-making, and action in and for the region.
- 4. Foster South-South collaboration' exchange of information, knowledge and experience.

Amount received and number years supported

The Grant awarded to this project was: US\$ 30,000 for one year

Activity undertaken

The Pan-Asia Risk Reduction Fellowship Program is a comprehensive fellowship opportunity for early to mid-career researchers in Asia to advance their knowledge and skills in research and action on risk reduction. This PARR program involved a series of capacity building activities with 13 Science or Policy-Practice Fellows from throughout Asia. The theme of the 2014/2015 PARR Program, the inaugural round of the program, was urban disaster risk and vulnerability under global environmental change.

The activities of the PARR Fellowship Program can be grouped into three types. First, a critical component of the PARR program entails a fellowship residence at a Host Institution where Fellows learn from the experiences and skills of another regional institution. This cross-cultural and cross-institutional exchange provides an opportunity for Fellows to gain a regional perspective on issues of risk reduction and return to their institutions with added insights. The 2014/2015 PARR Fellows participated in a residence of two to four weeks at one of four institutions (Kyoto University, Japan; Manila Observatory, Philippines; University of Los Baños, Philippines; and National Science and Technology Center for Disaster Risk Reduction, Taiwan).

Second, PARR Fellows and representatives from the host institutions participate in integrative activities that begin and end the fellowship period. The Inception Meeting and Culmination

Conference provide Fellows and institution representatives a space to develop collaborations, share experiences, identify expectations, and provide thematic and process-oriented insights to inform the fellowship. The 2014/2015 PARR program organized an Inception Meeting during July 2014 in Manila, Philippines, hosted by Manila Observatory. The Culmination Conference of this inaugural round was held in March 2015, hosted by Thammasat University and SEA-START in Bangkok, Thailand. Finally, a competitive call for applications enabled Fellows to further develop the research and skills learned during the residence by implementing follow-on projects in their home countries. These small grants provided opportunities for Fellows to use their newly gained skills and knowledge to advance their goals and fellowship outcomes. Several Fellows used their projects and experience towards their PhD completion. In addition, the follow-on grant experience affords the Fellows exposure to how to manage grants, including reporting and contracts. The 2014/2015 PARR program awarded four three-month follow-on project grants.

Results

- Thirteen Fellowships awarded from seven countries throughout Asia.
- Fellowship residencies at Host Institutions in the Philippines (2), Japan, and Taiwan.
- Inception Conference to introduce Fellows, meet Host institutions, and begin to build a collaborative network.
- Competitive call for proposals for Fellows to pursue follow-on project grants for exploratory research, trainings or workshops, or proposal and publication development.
- Culmination Meeting to reflect on the experiences of the implementation of the inaugural round and to provide a platform for fellows to present and synthesize results.

Relevance to the APN Goals, Science Agenda and to Policy Processes

The PARR Fellowship Program addresses the thematic focus and goals of APN. The PARR program focuses on issues of risk reduction, associated with global environmental change and sustainable development. The 2014/2015 Fellows centered on a range of risk and global environmental change issues including social vulnerability to floods, science and risk communication, institutional and community adaptive capacity to floods, and flood loss and damage. The wide variety of topics speaks to the complexities of risk in Asia and the need for sustainable development to reduce the impact of risk.

The PARR Fellowship Program is inherently capacity development for Asian scientists and institutions to achieve strong science to inform action. The PARR program focuses on regional exchanges for fellowship residence to foster cooperation across the region. The emphasis on science and policy-practice fellowships seeks to facilitate interactions between science and practice. In addition, the emphasis on strong institutional engagement of Home and Host institutions with Fellows works towards establishing connections and networks for regional collaboration on risk reduction.

Potential for further work

The PARR Fellowship Program was established through a collaborative effort of regional and international organizations, identified as the PARR Alliance, with experience in capacity building and risk reduction. Under the collaborative efforts of the PARR Alliance, the PARR Fellowship Program will continue with future cohorts of Fellows through generous support of a range of financial and organizational support. The next round of Fellowships is expected to be announced in late 2015 and

will occur over a period of one year.

Preface

The Pan-Asia Risk Reduction (PARR) Fellowship Program offers unique research, training and educational opportunities to Asian researchers, practitioners, and policy makers to enhance their capabilities for advancing and applying knowledge on critical issues of GEC and risk in the Asia-Pacific. The 2014-2015 PARR Fellowship Program provided Fellowships for scientific capacity development on the topic of urban disaster risk and vulnerability under global environmental change.

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1.0 Introduction

Urgent and sustained action to build more resilient and adaptive development pathways is needed in Asia to effectively address the environmental risk and human security challenges emanating from current and future global environmental change and associated drivers of change. Proactive approaches are needed that enable integrated and strategic understanding and management of the increasing complexities arising from these challenges. New knowledge and skills must fill critical gaps that persist in the region, even given the multitude of successes of existing efforts and organizations. In addition, emerging leaders who ask questions of the status quo, think "outside the box" in addressing national, regional and global challenges, and inspire others to do the same must be nurtured. Such efforts must move beyond the recent proliferation of workshops and passive, webbased knowledge portals to a comprehensive strategy for reinvigorating research and education efforts, particularly related to disaster risk reduction (DRR) and vulnerability, impacts, and adaptation (VIA) research across environments and sectors. The expected degree of success in undertaking such approaches also demands having a well-informed citizenry, responsive institutions, and knowledge generation that is problem-driven and solution-oriented.

The Pan-Asia Risk Reduction (PARR) Fellowship Program offers unique research, training and educational opportunities to Asian researchers, practitioners, and policy makers to enhance their capabilities for advancing and applying knowledge on critical issues of GEC and human-environment security in the Asia-Pacific. "PARR Fellows" are matched with a mentor at a Host Institution where they carry out individually designed risk reduction projects while also strengthening communication skills, thus equipping them to produce, communicate and apply science that is relevant and usable across the science-policy-practice interface. All PARR participants and their institutions are involved in periodic integrative activities that promote additional skill-building and the development a cohesive network of people capable of confronting the challenges of GEC and human-environment security through risk management. The PARR Program is a currently being pioneered by an international alliance of science-focused, research, education and capacity building organizations that share a common goal and complementary track records for advancing resilience and sustainability in the Asia-Pacific.

The principal objectives of the program are to:

- Train a cadre of young Asian scientists and professionals in advanced understanding and management of the complex relationships between GEC and human and environmental security;
- Strengthen the capacities of a spectrum of regional institutions (e.g., universities, research institutions, NGOs, government agencies, the private sector) to provide relevant opportunities for inter- and trans-disciplinary research, education and application; and
- Nurture a collaborative and sustainable network of such individuals and institutions so that it becomes an active resource for promoting and facilitating future research, decision-making, and action in and for the region.
- Foster South-South collaboration' exchange of information, knowledge and experience.



2.0 Methodology

The PARR Fellowship Program was established through a collaboration of regional and international science-focused, research, education and capacity building organizations during a meeting in September 2013. The organizations formed the PARR Alliance that supported the inaugural round of the PARR program through generous human and financial resources. The inaugural round of the PARR program provides an opportunity to advance the goals and visibility of the PARR program.

The inaugural round of the PARR program worked with four Host Institutions identified by the PARR Alliance. The Host Institutions – Kyoto University (Japan), Manila Observatory (Philippines), University of Los Baños (Philippines), and National Science and Technology Center for Disaster Risk Reduction (Taiwan) – represent a diverse range of programs on risk reduction and a history of strong mentorship and training. Given the strengths of the PARR Alliance and of the identified Host Institutions, the PARR Alliance identified a theme of *urban disaster risk and vulnerability under global environmental change*, with a particular emphasis on coastal cities.




Figure 1. Map of Fellowship exchanges between Home and Host Institutions

The Fellows of the inaugural round of the PARR Fellowship Program were identified through a pointed call for applications with PARR Alliance members and networks to fill a limited number of available Fellowships. PARR Fellows were invited to apply in teams of two – one Science Fellow and one Policy or Practice Fellow – to participate in a one-month fellowship residence and integrative activities. Call for applications were elicited from nine institutions (Home Institutions) in seven countries for a total of 13 Fellows (See Figure 1 and Appendix A).

The 2014-2015 PARR Fellowship Program experience occurred over eight months, from July 2014 to March 2015. The fellowship period began with a two-day Inception Conference hosted by Manila Observatory (Philippines), a PARR Alliance member. Fellows and Home and Host institution representatives shared expectations for the Fellowship and began to develop a network of researchers and practitioners across Asia. The first-day of the conference focused on introducing all participants to the PARR program, including external representatives. Fellows gave brief presentations on their research interests, participated in an activity to establish expectations, and engaged in conversations with the PARR Alliance and representative institutions on disaster risk reduction led by Professor Rajib Shaw. During the second day, Fellows explored Manila on a field trip of disaster risk in the city. A list of all Fellows in attendance and the Inception Conference program can be found in Appendix B and C.



During October and November 2014, the Fellows attended their fellowship residence at the Host Institution for targeted training and partnership building. Fellows used the residence to conduct original research, participate in trainings, receive mentorship, give presentations at the Host Institution, and complete a deliverable, such as an academic paper or project proposal. For example, four Fellows were in residence at the National Science & Technology Center for Disaster Reduction (NCDR), in Taiwan, where they participated in a training on post-disaster recovery hosted by NCDR, presented at the International Centre of Excellence for Integrated Research on Disaster Risk (IRDR) at Academia Sinica, visited NCDR field sites, and were mentored by the diverse expertise of NCDR. Fellowship residence ranged from two weeks to one month and the PARR program through generous support of several institutions covered costs and provided living stipends to the Fellows.

PARR Fellows were invited to apply for a competitive follow-on project grant to further develop what was learned during the Fellowship residence. Eight Fellows applied for the follow-on project grant and the available funds enabled the support of four project grants from \$2,000 to \$5,000. The grants ranged from the creation and testing of a decision support system in the Philippines, a damage and loss analysis of flood risk in Malaysia, an analysis of the linkage between poor urbanization and disaster in India, and validation of a framework for school-community collaboration for coastal community resilience. Fellows had three - six months to implement the projects during 2014-2015.

In March 2015, PARR Fellows, Host Institution representatives, and the PARR Alliance gathered for the inaugural round PARR Culmination Conference. The Culmination Conference provided an opportunity for Fellows to present their research and experience as PARR Fellows, to engage in dialogue with the PARR Alliance, and continue to establish a network of researchers and practitioners engaging in research on risk reduction in Asia. In addition, Alliance members, Fellows,

host institutions, and home institutions were able to reflect on the experiences on the implementation of the inaugural round, to identify and strengthen the competitive advantage of the program and assess the challenges and opportunities for its continuation.

The first day highlighted the current state of risk reduction research with special reference to the recently-drafted Sendai Framework which declares the four priority areas for disaster risk reduction:
1) understanding disaster risk; 2) strengthening disaster risk governance; 3) investing in disaster risk reduction; and 4) enhancing disaster preparedness. The remaining sessions were allotted for "PARR Cafe Dialogues" to allow Fellows to share their experience, research project, and future collaborations with their cohort and Alliance members. Conversations led to valuable comments and recommendations for how Fellows could move forward with their work.

The second day provided a venue for the Fellows and PARR Alliance Members to share their reflections and experiences on the Inaugural Round of the Program and to provide recommendations for the next round, such as the need for joint transdisciplinary approach to research, a clear fellowship structure, mechanism for research interest alignment between fellows and host institutions, built-in activities for exchange between fellows, establishing the roles of the Fellows in the sustainability and continuity of the program, and the selection of research themes and topics based on the Sendai Framework priority areas.

The third day was held in conjunction of the annual conference for the Costal Cities at Risk project. The meeting brought together researchers from the Canada, Thailand, Philippines and Nigeria. A representative of governor Mr. Sukhumbhand Paribatra attended the meeting to provide the welcoming address, along with an opening address from the Canadian Ambassador to Thailand, Mr. Philip Calvert. The opening day also had two panel sessions moderated by representatives from the Thai Public Broadcasting Service. These panel discussions focused on perspectives of urban climate resilience building and educating and communication climate change information. The Fellows were able to network, share experiences, and learn from this five-year project on urban issues. A list of all Fellows in attendance and the Culmination Conference program can be found in Appendix D and E.



3.0 Results & Discussion

Several strengths and accomplishments are evident in the 2014/2015 inaugural round of the PARR program. Key outputs of the Fellowship experience thus far include:

- The completion of 13 PARR Fellowships, including fellowship residence periods of 2-4 weeks in duration, implementation of four competitively-awarded follow-on project grants and a successful inception meeting.
- Reflection from Fellows about the importance of the international exchange for learning new methods and skills for implementing risk reduction research, experiencing different approaches to risk reduction, collaborating with a variety of mentors and graduate students, and general cultural exchange.
- One Fellow (Okta) has already published an article on her PARR-related work in the
 International Journal of Disaster Risk Reduction. Several Fellows have given subject matter
 lectures at both their Home and Host Institutions, and others have presented on their PARRrelated work and fellowship experiences, including presentations at Academia Sinica and the
 IRDR ICOE in Taiwan.
- With Fellows as the link, some Home and Host Institutions are developing partnerships on other activities; this is especially evident in the relationship between NCDR and Manila Observatory.

We expect other examples of strengths, accomplishments, outputs and emerging outcomes to be realized in the coming months.

The implementation of the PARR inaugural round revealed several challenges and opportunities for the second round of PARR Fellowships:

- Length of the Fellowship period: A Fellowship residence of one month was too short for
 Fellows to truly gain experiences and skills from the Host Institution. And some Fellows only
 stayed in residence for two weeks. While several PARR Fellows expressed having many new
 experiences to take back to their Home Institution, there would be greater impact with a
 longer period of time in residence.
- Engagement of policy and practice: The inaugural round of the PARR program combined the PARR Research and Practice-Policy Fellows into two-person teams. We found that collaboration amongst the teams was often limited due to inadequate planning of the two-person teams or the inability of the teams to participate in their residency at the same time. As policy and practitioner involvement is a key niche in the PARR program, there is great opportunity to re-envision the involvement of policy or practice participants in the PARR program, as described below.
- Home Institution engagement: In the limited time period of the inaugural round, there was
 little time to engage with Fellows' Home Institutions to foster an added benefit for Home
 Institutions in permitting their employees to become Fellows to participate in the Fellowship
 residence. Further engagement with Home Institutions through their participation in
 integrative activities and through other network building efforts could be expected to
 develop connections and collaborations between Home and Host Institutions with Fellows as
 a catalyst.
- Network building: Due to the short Fellowship period and inadequate funding for dedicated staff time for PARR implementation, network building amongst Fellows and between Fellows and Home and Host Institutions received limited attention from the program managers or PARR Alliance members. Such networks and the future opportunities that grow from them are a critical and hugely influential outcome of a Fellowship program. This component of PARR requires and deserves time and strategic thought.
- Logistics: Given the condensed timeline and swift implementation of the inaugural round of PARR, several key logistical pieces could not be adequately implemented, including the call for applications process and the accountability for outputs. Future rounds of the PARR program will require additional thought in guaranteeing the most qualified Fellows that will follow through with notable outputs.

4.0 Conclusions

The PARR Fellowship Program is designed to provide holistic fellowship experiences that support participants from proposal development through research/project implementation to dissemination and application of results and outcomes. Program opportunities prioritize a transboundary and cross-sectoral approach to understanding and reducing risk, which enhances the capacity of Fellows to confront GEC and human-security challenges from an integrative perspective. A PARR Fellow becomes a regional leader in risk reduction who, through this program, gains skills in 'systems' perspectives, futures literacy and effective communication and synthesis. PARR Fellows also acquire practical skills in project and budget management and networking. Each round of fellowships produces a trained cohort of researchers, practitioners, and policy makers who are able to support resilient development in the Asia-Pacific region to manage current and projected risks from GEC.

The PARR Fellowship Program fulfils the needs of the region for researchers, practitioners, and policy makers who are able to plan with foresight to address the increasingly complex challenges of GEC and human-environment security. The Program establishes a knowledge to action network of people and institutions capable of developing and implementing innovative approaches to planning and action at local, national, and regional levels.

The PARR Fellowship Program is a dynamic and innovative program developed out of the strengths of many partner institutions within and outside of Asia. In 2014-2015, the PARR Alliance implemented the inaugural round of the PARR Fellowship Program, which offered opportunities to train a small cohort of Fellows, develop partnerships, and produce rapid outputs to further the program's development and impact. Assessment of the inaugural round and a database of other fellowships and training opportunities related to risk reduction has revealed several opportunities for the continuation of the PARR Fellowship program.

5.0 Future Directions

The PARR Fellowship Program was established through a collaborative effort of regional and international organizations, identified as the PARR Alliance, with experience in capacity building and risk reduction. Under the collaborative efforts of the PARR Alliance, the PARR Fellowship Program will continue with a future cohort of Fellows through generous support of a range of financial and organizational support. The call for the next round of Fellowships is under development and is expected to be released in 2016.






