



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BACKGROUND

The Asia-Pacific Network of Early Career Professionals for Global Change Research (APN-ECAP) is a pivotal initiative that aims to integrate and amplify the contributions of early career professionals in the fields of global change and sustainability. It's a collaborative endeavor funded by Asia-Pacific Network for Global Change Research (APN), Japan, and implemented by the Center of Research for Environment, Energy, and Water (CREEW), Nepal, designed to bridge the gap between emerging talents and established experts in sustainability.

The first Regional Workshop APN-ECAP Nexus: Sparking ECAPs Visibility in Global Change Research and Sustainability was more than just a gathering; it was a concerted effort to empower early career professionals (ECAPs) with the knowledge, skills, and network needed to take on leadership roles in sustainability research. It emphasized not only the importance of discussions on sustainability challenges but also focused on building a community of ECAPs equipped to make a substantial impact in their respective fields.

The intergenerational workshop was designed not just as a meeting point for diverse age groups but as a breeding ground for innovative ideas and sustainable solutions. The expected outcome was to establish a forward-thinking and adaptable governance structure within APN-ECAP network, driven by a diverse array of perspectives and expertise. The event serves as a compelling example of how blending intergenerational experiences and viewpoints can significantly influence the future of APN-ECAP.

INTRODUCTION

The First Regional Workshop of the Asia-Pacific Network of Early Career Professionals (APN-ECAP), held at the Asian Institute of Technology (AIT) in Thailand on December 6, 2023, marked a pivotal moment in the collaborative journey of ECAPs toward addressing global change and sustainability challenges. This workshop, a cornerstone initiative of APN-ECAP, was not just a congregation of minds but a crucible for forging the future path of sustainability research in the Asia-Pacific region.

The event was co-organized by APN, CREEW in collaboration with AIT and with the support of the 3rd International Symposium on Disaster Resilience and Sustainable Development (DRSD 2023). At its core, this workshop aimed to foster intergenerational collaboration and inclusivity, where the voices and ideas of emerging professionals played a central role in shaping the network's governance structure alongside their experienced counterparts.








Picture 1: Participant's age range




Picture 3: Participant's academic background

ACTIVITES

Opening Session

The workshop started with an organized registration process, followed by a series of opening remarks that set a tone of collaborative wisdom and forward-thinking innovation. Distinguished speakers highlighted the importance of blending the experiences of seasoned experts with the fresh ideas of young professionals in addressing global sustainability challenges.

Dr. Indrajit Pal went on to discuss his nine years of work at AIT, during which he focused on engaging with different networks, especially young professionals and educational networks. He highlighted Dr. Saurav KC's efforts in initiating APN-ECAP and welcomed young minds and researchers to the event. Dr. Pal emphasized the workshop's significance in fostering collaboration and engagement among ECAPs. He congratulated the team for bringing this concept to reality and stressed the importance of early career professionals in research. Dr. Pal recognized the need to increase their visibility and engagement at the global level. He concluded by underscoring the timely nature of the event in providing opportunities for young professionals involved in real-time projects.

Dr. Nafesa Ismail, representing Dr. Linda Stevenson, Head of Scientific Affairs and Knowledge Management at the Asia Pacific Network for Global Change Research, extended a warm welcome to all participants and honored keynote speakers. She emphasized the goal of strengthening ECAPs visibility in global change and sustainability, in the Asia Pacific region. She highlighted the importance of recognizing young professionals as essential stakeholders in sustainable development and their role in global change and sustainability research. She further emphasized the regional workshop's role in laying a strong foundation for the project, inviting participants to actively contribute to turning principles into effective practice.

Prof. Sangam Shrestha the Scientific Planning Group (SPG) Member, APN, and Dean of the School of Engineering and Technology at the Asian Institute of Technology (AIT), Thailand expressed enthusiasm for AIT's involvement in the APN-ECAP project. Prof. Sangam emphasized collaboration with global institutions, including APN and CREEW, to address global sustainability issues and empower ECAPs. He praised the thematic focus of the first APN-ECAP regional workshop and its potential to foster innovative perspectives and solutions. Prof. Sangam had confidence in the platform's ability to connect young researchers with experienced professionals, empowering them as leaders for global sustainability. He highlighted the importance of APN-ECAP as a network for knowledge sharing and urged active involvement in shaping sustainable solutions. Prof. Sangam committed to promoting APN-ECAP within his network and encouraged others to do the same.

Ms. Naomi Young, Programme Officer, Knowledge Management and Scientific Affairs at the Secretariat of APN, APN-ECAP operates within the larger framework of APN, which has six focus areas and four strategic goals, including capacity development and stakeholder engagement. Ms. Young highlighted APN-ECAP's role in contributing to global agendas related to climate change, disaster risk reduction, and sustainability. She mentioned that APN's projects are often led by ECAPs from developing countries, with a focus on science-policy linkages. The regional workshop supports ECAPs through various activities, including training workshops, webinars, conferences, and an Annual Call for Proposals. She also emphasized APN-ECAP plays a crucial role in empowering and engaging early career professionals in the Asia-Pacific region in addressing global sustainability challenges.

Dr. Dhundi Raj Pathak, President of CREEW highlighted the significance of APN-ECAP as a momentous achievement in establishing a dynamic community of young scientists dedicated to addressing global change and sustainability, expressing appreciation to APN for their collaborative efforts in supporting early career researchers. He extended best wishes to all participants for a productive regional workshop, emphasizing the importance of providing a conducive space for participants to articulate their ideas and expectations, contributing to the network's sustained functionality.

Dr. Saurav KC, Project Lead of APN-ECAP and Deputy Executive Director at CREEW, highlighted the project's alignment with APN's operational mandate to encourage ECAPs in science, research, and development related to global sustainability. Dr. Saurav described the activities conducted, including the Proposal Development and Training Workshop (PDTW) in May 2023, which involved networking sessions for ECAPs to gather ideas for the project's sustainability. The APN-ECAP Kick-off meeting in November 2023 drew over 100 participants, featuring senior scientists discussing opportunities and benefits of the network. It also included an interactive panel discussion with ECAPs. He outlined the workshop's objectives, including facilitating intergenerational communication, formulating diverse structures for APN-ECAP's sustainable management, and exploring collaboration opportunities among participants for global research and sustainability efforts.

Ms. Susmita Mishra, Research Associate, CREEW provided insights into APN-ECAP, emphasizing the diverse composition of the group, consisting of participants from various age groups, gender balance, and different thematic backgrounds. APN-ECAP focuses on accelerating global change and sustainability in the Asia-Pacific region, defining ECAPs as individuals under 40 years in APN Focus Countries, with specific educational and work experience criteria. An advisory group representing different countries in the Asia-Pacific region was formed at the project's outset. The objectives of APN-ECAP revolve around ECAPs' engagement in networking, planning, and action, to enhance ECAPs' capacity in decision-making and advocacy for sustainability. The project is divided into three phases, including Inception and Development, Pilot Implementation, and Implementation.

Focused Sessions on Intergenerational Collaboration

Group Composition: Participants in the workshop were divided into five groups. Group 1 was comprised of the youngest participants, while Group 2 included senior participants attending the workshop. Group 3,4, and 5 were composed of participants aged between 25-35.

Topics of Discussion: Groups 1 and 2 engaged in individual discussions on the following three specific topics:

- APN-ECAP Membership Management
- Five Flagship Activities of APN-ECAP
- Sources of Opportunities and Knowledge Products for APN-ECAP Network

While Group 3,4, and 5 focused on preparing APN-ECAP Governance Structure.

Independent Discussions: During the initial part of the session, each group focused on these topics, dedicating one-third of the session time to these discussions. This allowed them to delve deeply into the subject matter.

Merged Discussions: Subsequently, the two groups (Group 1 and Group 2) came together to merge their discussions and comment on the outcomes generated by each group. This collaborative phase enabled them to synthesize ideas and perspectives from both the younger and senior participants.

Governance Structure Development: Meanwhile, the remaining three groups (Group 3, Group 4, and Group 5) worked independently on developing governance structures for the APN-ECAP project. These governance structures likely pertained to the organizational framework and decision-making processes within the initiative.

Intergenerational Input: To ensure a comprehensive and inclusive approach to governance, Groups 1 and 2 shared their insights and input on governance structures with Groups 3, 4, and 5. This exchange of ideas and recommendations helped refine the governance structure of each group with an intergenerational perspective.

Intergenerational Exchange and Networking

The last session of the workshop concluded with four presentations. The first presentation was jointly delivered by Groups 1 and 2, summarizing their discussions on APN-ECAP Membership Management, Flagship Activities, and Knowledge Sources. The remaining three presentations likely focused on the governance structure discussions, reflecting the input and collaboration from all groups.

The key outputs of Group 1 and 2 are as follows:



APN-ECAP Membership Management

- Membership recruitment based on research area
- Membership Retention : Based on Experience and Age
- Sustainability of the group: Benefits, Fees, discounts, support for conference or workshop, Exchange program, Releasing Monthly newsletter, local group meet up for collaboration, social media

APN-ECAP Five Flagship Activities

- Mentoring, Internship, Skill Development Program, Fun Learning, Friendly Competition, Brainstorming Session on Integrating AI /ML /DS
- Capacity Building, Fellowship, Collaborative Research, Inter/transdisciplinary research, Exchange Program, Inter-generational dialogue

- Government and Non-Government agencies, UNEP, IHE Delf, UNESCO, UN Haitat, UN-ECAP, SEI, K-WATER, APN, SANDEE, ICIMOD, USAID, JICA, SEI, GIZ




Figure: APN-ECAP Governance Structure by Group 3





Figure: APN-ECAP Governance Structure by Group 4






Figure: APN-ECAP Governance Structure by Group 5






















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
